Mamie Frasier Thomas hails from the metropolis city of Hinesville, Ga., where she was raised through her teenage years. Although she was sheltered, at an early age she became aware of blatant injustices in her community. It was an exciting time because civil rights leaders were standing up, visible, present and with wisdom lead guidance, brought about life changes in the city.

She was enrolled at Liberty County High School for two years wherein the students were bused to and from Miday. Upon law-required integration, she became a student at Bradwell Institute, (which is now the Liberty County Board of Education). There was much injustice in the process of combining the two high schools. However, she was in the first graduating class of the new Bradwell Institute, 1974.

She attended a secondary school and upon completion she voluntarily joined the US Army. Upon retiring from the military (1997), she worked eighteen years for the federal government and retired in 2020. During her tenure in these jobs, she received several certificates, awards and recognitions.

Upon retiring Mamie Thomas knew that there was something else that she should be doing. She wasn't sure what that was until she became involved in the release from prison process. She became painfully aware that the process had huge flaws and that some young people were being detained, unlawfully. That's how she migrated to the Liberty County ReEntry Coalition.

She currently works at the Liberty County Boys and Girls Club. Her passion is to assist parents and the community in producing productive citizens, enhance their awareness and to give them a passion to give back.
